SNOW CREATION

Build a fantasy miniature snow creation—not for throwing snowballs, but for the fun of creating a new design.

First choose your theme: Will it be a castle, an ice-skating rink with a warming house, a cottage in the forest...?

Then, pick your shapes. Small plastic buckets, plastic food containers, ice cube trays, and ice cream scoopers, for example, make good molds to use to build the foundation and walls.

You can make a conical roofline by packing a kitchen funnel with snow. Carve windows and designs in the sides with a butter knife or plastic spatula.

Cut out decorations from colorful paper and mount them on your creation with toothpicks. Press small stones or other items from nature into the walls for a natural look.
